

DEPARTMENTS

ADMIN – PLAN AHEAD -Willard's spring cleanup with be Tuesday, May 28th, Wednesday, May 29th, and Thursday, May 30th.

You can now update the contact information for your water account on our website. You can also report a concern to Public Works or inquire about a park reservation.

Water meters will not be manually read during the winter months. Our Public Works Director is concerned that exposing meters to cold temperatures could cause them to freeze. Water used over the base amount of 17,000 gallon per month will be billed in the spring.

- POLICE All dogs over 6 months of age are required to be licensed. Willard City allows a maximum of 3 dogs per residence. The Police Department will be following up on unlicensed dogs, and citations could be issued. Spring is the time the Police Department starts getting dog complaints. Dogs are required to be on a leash when not on your property. If you take them for a walk to "do their business", please clean up after them.
- **PUBLIC WORKS –** Please clear debris from the sides of the roads to allow for spring maintenance. Now is a good time to make sure there is clear access to your water meter; that is it not covered by dirt, debris, or bushes.

Property owners are responsible for the sewer line from their home to the main line, including sewer cleanouts. Make sure sewer cleanouts are cut off at ground level and capped or protected to avoid debris from causing costly back-ups into your house and breaking off.

Upcoming Activity: The annual earthquake preparedness drill, the Great Utah Shake Out will be Thursday, April 18th, 2024.





Did you know that four-leaf clovers can have more than four leaves? The more leaves they have, the rarer they are! Some clovers * * *

have five, six, or more leaves. In 2009, Shigeo Obara found a clover with 56 leaves, the most ever recorded. The four-leaf clover isn't the symbol of Ireland. You wouldn't be the first to think so, as the New York Times made the same error in 2017. However, they quickly corrected their mistake the next day. The correct symbol for Ireland is the shamrock. They're technically the same plant, but the shamrock has only three leaves, while a four-leaf clover has four. Saint Patrick used shamrock leaves to represent the Father, Son, and Holy Spirit.
