The November 2023 General Election ballots for Brigham City, Perry City, and Willard City will include a municipal ballot question known as Proposition 1. It reads:

PROPOSED ACTION TO REPEAL WILLARD CITY'S 0.25% MASS TRANSIT SALES AND USE TAX. Shall Willard City, Utah be authorized to repeal the one-quarter of one percent (0.25%) sales and use tax for the purchase of real property for UTA's frontrunner project in Willard City?

When you make a purchase in Brigham City, Perry City, or Willard, 6.9% in sales tax is collected. The sales tax is broken down as follows:

- Utah State receives 4.85%
- Willard City receives 1%
- Box Elder County receives .25%
- Mass transit receives .30%, plus an additional .25%
- Transportation infrastructure receives .25%.

Proposition 1 proposes to repeal the additional .25% mass transit tax, which was passed in 2008. Sales tax information can be found at: tax.utah.gov/sales tax/rate/23q4combined.pdf

The end of the year is approaching. Dog license and business license renewals will be mailed in November. All 2023 licenses will expire on December 31st. Licenses are due by January 30, 2024. Late fees will be charged after that date. Willard City requires proof of a current rabies vaccination. Make sure your dog's vaccine is current so you will be ready to register.

- ADMIN** – Pardon our dust while we update our website.
- POLICE** – Chief Fielding would like to remind residents to call dispatch at 435-734-3800 Option 0 if you need an officer for a non-emergency, such as a theft report or VIN verification. City personnel do not have direct contact with the officers. Call 911 if you have an emergency.
- FIRE** - Chief Mund said that now is the time to check your smoke detector batteries , change your furnace filters, and clean the lint out of your dryer vents.
 Do you have an address on your home? If so, is it visible and large enough to be read from the street during the day and illuminated at night? House numbers that are not visible could delay an emergency response. If you can't see your house numbers from the street neither can emergency personnel.
- PUBLIC WORKS – Parks.** Restrooms in the City parks are closed for the winter.
Streets. Winter is approaching. Please clear debris from the sides of the roads to allow for maintenance and snow plowing. This is for the safety of our drivers and to avoid damaging City equipment and your property. If snow cannot be pushed off of the asphalt, it melts and freezes, which causes hazardous conditions for drivers and pedestrians. **Do not push snow from your driveways or sidewalks into the City streets.** It is a violation of City Code. It can create a hazard and damage snowplows.
- o **Water** – Water meters are the property of the City. Do not get into your meter box unless you are a licensed plumber. Please make sure your water meter is clear and accessible by trimming bushes and moving vehicles. As temperatures drop below freezing, consider leaving a tap dripping to prevent frozen pipes. Pay attention to your usage. Average winter usage is 5,000 to 10,000 gallons per month per household. If your usage is going up during the winter months, you might have a leak.
